The Chile-Born Community in Victoria — 2016 Census (ranked 45)



Demographic characteristics

At the 2016 Census, there were 7,416 Chile-born persons in Victoria (28.4% of Australia's total), ranked 45th among the overseas-born communities in Victoria. The Chile-born increased by 4.5% (321) from 7,095 persons in 2011. They are distributed throughout Metropolitan Melbourne, with significant concentrations in the LGAs of Casey (13.9%), Brimbank (10.1%), Greater Dandenong (7.8%), Melton (7.0%) and Wyndham (5.9%).

The Chile-born reflected a mature to ageing profile: 5.0% were aged 25 years and below; 32.3% were aged 26-44 years; 38.9% were aged 45-64 years; and 23.9% were aged 65 years and over. The median age was 50 years, compared to 37 years for total Victoria. The gender ratio was 89 males to 100 females, compared to 96 males to 100 females for Victoria.

There were 9,888 persons with Chilean ancestry. Most were born in Chile (49.8%) and Australia (46.3%). Over three- quarters (77.0%) of the Chile-born in Victoria had arrived in Australia prior to 1996; 2.9% arrived in 1996-2000; 2.9% arrived in 2001-2005; 4.2% arrived in 2006-2010; and 10.3% arrived in 2011-2016.

Most of the Chile-born speak Spanish (84.4%). Of those who speak a language other than English, 13.2% speak English not well or not at all. Over half (56.2%) of the Chile-born are Catholic, 5.5% are Christians not further defined; 21.9% have no religion. Nearly three-quarters (73.4%) have Australian citizenship, compared to 58.3% for the total overseas-born population in Victoria.







Economic characteristics

The education levels of the Chile-born are fairly similar to those for total Victoria. The exception is that there are more of the Chile-born with advanced diploma and diploma and certificate education (32.1%) compared to Victoria (23.6%); and less with school education only (33.1%) compared with Victoria (38.7%).

The labour force participation rate of the Chile-born at 61.6% is similar to that for total Victoria at 60.5%. Their unemployment rate at 7.7% is slightly higher than total Victoria at 6.6%.

The occupational patterns of the Chile-born are fairly different from those for total Victoria. Less of them are managers (8.8%), professionals (19.3%) and sales workers (5.0%), compared to 13.5%, 23.3% and 9.7% for Victoria. More of them are community and personal service workers (14.7%), machinery operators and drivers (8.4%) and labourers (16.0%), compared to 10.6%, 5.8% and 9.0% for Victoria.

The industry of employment patterns for the Chile-born are slightly different from those for total Victoria. More of them are employed in manufacturing (10.9%), professional, scientific, technical and administration (16.4%) and healthcare and social assistance (17.0%), compared to Victoria (7.8%, 11.4% and 12.5%).

The weekly personal income distribution pattern for the Chile-born is different from that for total Victoria. More of them have moderate incomes: 25.4% receive \$1-\$399 and 46.1% receive \$400-\$1,249, compared to 20.1% and 39.8% for Victoria. Less of the Chile-born (17.0%) receive \$1,250 or more, compared to 21.1% for Victoria.
