The Russian Federation-Born Community in Victoria — 2016 Census (ranked 49)



Demographic characteristics

At the 2016 Census, there were 6,307 Russia-born persons in Victoria (30.9% of Australia's total), ranked 49th among the overseas-born communities in Victoria. The Russia-born increased by 3.9% (239) from 6,068 persons in 2011. They are distributed throughout Metropolitan Melbourne, with major concentrations in the LGAs of Glen Eira (20.4%), Kingston (10.3%), Port Phillip (6.6%), Bayside (5.5%) and Monash (5.5%).

The Russia-born reflected an adult to ageing profile: 12.7% were aged 25 years and under; 37.3% were aged 26-44; 25.3% were aged 45-64; and 24.8% were aged 65 years and over. The median age was 44 years, compared to 37 years for total Victoria. The gender ratio was 63 males to 100 females, compared to 96 males to 100 females for total Victoria.

There were 24,701 persons identified with Russian ancestry. Most of them were born in Australia (43.5%), the Russian Federation (21.5%), Ukraine (6.1%), China (3.6%) and Germany (1.6%). Two-fifths (40.2%) of the Russia-born in Victoria had arrived in Australia prior to 1996; 11.8% arrived in 1996-2000; 11.4% arrived in 2001-2005; 15.0% arrived in 2006-2010; and 19.3% arrived in 2011-2016.

Most (79.3%) of the Russia-born speak Russian, 0.8% speak Hebrew; 14.3% speak English only. Of those who speak a language other than English, 15.4% speak English not well or not at all. Over one-quarter (28.3%) of the Russia-born are Eastern Orthodox; 16.8% are Jewish; and 7.5% are Christian not further defined; 2.5% are Catholic; 0.7% follow Islam; 34.8% have no religion. Three-quarters (74.6%) of the Russia-born have Australian citizenship, compared to 58.3% for the total overseas-born population in Victoria.





Economic characteristics

The education levels of the Russia-born are higher than for total Victoria: 13.5% have a postgraduate degree, 35.8% have a bachelor degree and 12.3% have an advanced diploma or diploma, compared to 5.4%, 16.5% and 9.2% for Victoria. One-fifth (20.5%) of the Russia-born have school education only, compared to 38.7% for Victoria.

The labour force participation rate of the Russia-born at 60.5% is similar to that of total Victoria. Their unemployment rate at 8.1% is higher than for total Victoria at 6.6%.

The occupational patterns of the Russia-born are fairly different from those for total Victoria. More of them (40.1%) work as professionals, compared to 23.3% for Victoria. Less of them work as technicians (9.7%), sales workers (6.9%), machinery operators and drivers (3.1%) and labourers (4.5%), compared to 13.1%, 9.7%, 5.8% and 9.0% for Victoria.

The employment patterns of the Russia-born are fairly similar to those for total Victoria, with some exceptions. Less of them (5.8%) are employed in manufacturing, construction (5.6%) and accommodation and food services (3.4%), compared to 7.8%, 8.3% and 6.6% for Victoria. More of them are employed in professional, scientific, technical and administration (20.3%) and healthcare and social assistance (14.1%), compared to 11.4% and 12.5% for Victoria.

The weekly personal income distribution pattern for the Russia-born is different from total Victoria. More of them receive nil income (11.4%), \$1-\$399 (23.3%), \$1,250-\$1,999 (14.7%) and \$2,000 or more (9.1 %), compared to 9.7%, 20.1%, 13.6% and 7.5% for Victoria. Less of the Russia-born receive \$400-\$799 (22.1%) and \$800-\$1,249 (15.0%), compared to 23.1% and 16.7% for Victoria.
