## Victorian Government Response to the Royal Commission into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse



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## Introduction

The Roya Commission into nstitutiona Responses to Chi d Sexua Abuse uncovered tragic and widespread abuse of chi dren who were in the care of government and non-government institutions. Chi dren reporting abuse were not be ieved and their a legations were ignored

We acknow edge the findings of historica abuse within Victorian Government institutions and the ongoing psychological and physical harm suffered by survivors

As part of the inquiry, survivors shared stories of the profound trauma they suffered whi e in the care of government and non-government institutions and spoke of the extent to which this trauma impacted their ives as chi dren and into adu thood. We acknow edge your strength, resi ience and courage and we thank you for your bravery in coming forward to make sure the abuse of chi dren was brought to ight

t is thanks to the courage of survivors of historica chi d sexua abuse that the Roya Commission was ab e to do its important work and we acknow edge your vita contribution

The Victorian Government is taking responsibility to make sure no child is failed again and the wrongs of the past are never repeated. We are a so making sure the needs of survivors are treated with the priority and importance they deserve

As we as making important recommendations for governments and institutions, the Roya Commission provided essentia support for survivors of abuse in Austra ia so their voices could be heard. We we come the release of the Final Report and thank the Royal Commission for its commitment and dedication in these important tasks

We are continually working to improve the ways we protect children, and the recommendations of the Royal Commission will be instrumental in guiding laws and practice to better protect children from abuse

This inc udes bui ding cu tures across the community that give chi dren and young peop e a voice, empower them to raise concerns, and making sure that our responses to their concerns are effective and appropriate

We are committed to working with other jurisdictions to protect a chi dren from abuse and imp ement more than 50 recommendations requiring intergovernmenta co aboration. The Victorian Government is consulting with the Australian Government and state and territory governments to progress these recommendations.

The Victorian Government is determined to make sure these fai ures to protect chi dren never happen again and survivors are given the care and support they need Our response to the Roya Commission reflects these commitments

For the next five years, the Victorian Government wi report annual y on its progress in building better protections for children

## Victoria's work to protect children

Victoria has taken strong action to prevent and respond to chi d sexua abuse, and wi continue to do so in responding to the Roya Commission

n particu ar, the Victorian Government has introduced a suite of significant reforms since the handing down of the andmark Victorian Par iamentary nquiry into the Handing of Chi d Abuse by Re igious and Other Non-Government Organisations, <u>Betrayal of Trust</u>, on 13 November 2013 n its <u>response</u>, the Victorian Government supported or supported in princip e a 15 of its recommendations

Many of the Roya Commission's recommendations have a ready been fu y or partia y imp emented in Victoria by reforms introduced to respond to the <u>Betrayal of Trust</u> report, inc uding new crimina offences, measures to create chi d safe organisations, and civi aw reforms to provide better access to justice for survivors of institutiona chi d abuse

Victoria is fina ising its implementation of a the recommendations of <u>Betrayal of Trust</u>, as described in detail below

#### **New criminal offences**

The Victorian Government has introduced three new crimina offences to further protect chi dren from abuse, inc uding

- a <u>grooming offence</u> that targets communication, inc uding on ine communication, with a chi d or their parents with the intent of committing chi d sexua abuse
- a <u>fai ure to disc ose offence</u> that requires adu ts to report to po ice a reasonab e be ief that a sexua offence has been committed against a chi d (un ess they have a <u>reasonab e excuse</u> for not doing so, such as fear for their safety)
- a <u>fai ure to protect offence</u> that app ies to peop e within organisations who knew of a risk of chi d sexua abuse by someone in the organisation and had the authority to reduce or remove the risk, but neg igent y fai ed to do so

## Child safe organisations

The Victorian Government has implemented a range of measures to create child safe organisations by strengthening the capacity of organisations to prevent and respond to the risks of child abuse. These measures include

- the introduction of <u>Victorian Chi d Safe Standards</u> that aim to drive cu tura change
  in organisations, so that protecting chi dren from the risks of abuse is embedded in
  everyday thinking and practice The <u>Victorian Chi d Safe Standards</u> are compu sory for a
  organisations that provide services to chi dren
- the introduction of a <u>reportable conduct scheme</u>, commencing in stages from 1 July 2017
   This scheme requires organisations with a high leve of responsibility for children to respond to a legations of childer ated misconduct made against their workers and volunteers, and report those a legations to the <u>Commissioner for Children and Young People</u>, ensuring independent scrutiny in preventing and responding to a legations of abuse

#### Civil law reforms

The Victorian Government is continuing to implement a range of civia w reforms to provide justice for survivors of institutional child abuse

On 1 Ju y 2017, the <u>Wrongs Amendment (Organisational Child Abuse) Act 2017</u> commenced The Act created a new duty of care that wi a ow an organisation to be he d responsible for child abuse that occurred in their organisation, unless the organisation proves that it took reasonable precautions to prevent the abuse

On 1 Ju y 2015, the <u>Limitation of Actions Amendment (Child Abuse) Act 2015</u> commenced The Act comp ete y removed the imitation periods that app ied to civi actions founded upon child abuse, with both retrospective and prospective effect. The reforms a so removed the 12-year ong-stop imitation period for wrongful death actions in relation to child abuse brought by dependents of a deceased victim.

On 5 June 2018, the <u>Legal Identity of Defendants (Organisational Child Abuse) Act 2018</u> received Roya Assent The Act provides that where an institutional child abuse plaintiff wishes to pursue damages against an unincorporated non-government organisation (NGO) that controls one or more associated trusts, that NGO must nominate an entity that is capable of being sued to act as a proper defendant of the NGO does not do so, the Act provides that the trustees of the associated trust or trusts are the proper defendants in the proceedings (on behalf of the NGO) and will incur any liability arising from the proceeding

The Victorian Government is undertaking the detailed policy work and consultation to implement the proposal that organisations that receive government funding to provide services to children must be incorporated and have adequate insurance, in order to ensure proper access to justice for child abuse plaintiffs, which was another recommendation of Betrayal of Trust

On 9 March 2018, Victoria was one of the first states in the country to sign up to the <u>Nationa Redress Scheme</u> On 8 May 2018, the <u>Victorian Government introduced egis ation to referowers to the Commonwea th Par iament</u> to a ow Victorian institutions to participate in the Scheme This will also respond to key recommendations of the Roya Commission

# Overview of Victorian Government Response to the recommendations of the Royal Commission

The Roya Commission made 409 recommendations in tota, inc uding more than 50 recommendations requiring governments to work together

- the Fina Report (2017) contained 189 recommendations
- the Working with Chi dren Checks Report (2015) contained 36 recommendations
- the Redress and Civi itigation Report (2015) contained 99 recommendations
- the <u>Crimina Justice Report</u> (2017) contained 85 recommendations

The Victorian Government Response inc udes a response to a 409 recommendations and does not reject any recommendations

n summary, the Victorian Government

- accepts 128 recommendations where a elements of the recommendation are supported
- accepts in princip e 165 recommendations, with further work to be done to determine how these recommendations best app y in Victoria
- states that Victoria wi give further consideration to 24 recommendations where further analysis is required for the Victorian Government to determine its approach
- notes 92 recommendations where responsibility for the recommendation does not sit with the Victorian Government

## The Findings of the Royal Commission

#### Understanding child sexual abuse in institutional contexts

<u>Vo umes 1 to 5</u> describe the findings of the Roya Commission regarding chi d sexua abuse These vo umes contain one recommendation that the Austra ian Government shou d conduct and pub ish a study on a regu ar basis to estab ish the extent of chi d ma treatment in Austra ia The Victorian Government Response notes this recommendation, which is a matter for the Austra ian Government

#### Making institutions child safe through prevention

Vo ume 6 contains 24 recommendations to improve institutiona safety for chi dren

The Victorian Government accepts three recommendations in Volume 6, accepts in principle 13 recommendations, and notes eight recommendations

The Victorian Government has a ready imp emented significant reforms to make institutions chi d safe, inc uding the imp ementation of the <u>Keeping Chi dren Safe from Chi d Sexua</u>
<u>Exp oitation Strategy</u>

The Victorian Government accepts the fo owing key recommendations

- that an independent oversight body shou d have the abi ity to provide advice and
  information to institutions and the community on the Chi d Safe Standards and coordinate
  ongoing information exchange between oversight bodies re ating to institutions'
  comp iance with the Chi d Safe Standards The Commissioner for Chi dren and Young
  Peop e (Victoria's independent oversight body) a ready fu fi s this recommendation
- that the Chi d Safe Standards recommended by the Roya Commission shou d be adopted as part of the new Nationa Statement of Princip es for Chi d Safe Organisations

The Victorian Government accepts in principe the following key recommendations

- that a institutions must meet ten Chi d Safe Standards identified by the Roya
   Commission Victoria a ready has <u>Chi d Safe Standards</u> that are mandatory for a
   organisations de ivering services to chi dren To ensure our state's standards remain
   as strong as possib e, the <u>Victorian Chi d Safe Standards</u> wi be reviewed in 2018–19,
   and adjustments to better a ign with the Roya Commission's recommendations wi be
   considered during that review
- · that measures to prevent on ine chi d sexua abuse shou d be imp emented

Victoria wi continue to work with the Austra ian Government and other states and territories to progress recommendations that require nationa cooperation

#### Improving institutional responding and reporting

<u>Vo ume 7</u> contains 12 recommendations regarding how government and non-government institutions shou d hand e comp aints, and the need for independent oversight of comp aint hand ing and reporting by institutions

The Victorian Government accepts five recommendations in Volume 7, accepts in principle six recommendations and will give further consideration to one recommendation

The Victorian Government accepts the fo owing key recommendations

- that chi d protection egis ation shou d be amended to provide adequate protection for individua s who make comp aints or reports in good faith about chi d sexua abuse to any institution engaged in chi d-re ated work
- that periodic review of the operation of reportable conduct schemes should be undertaken (a review of the <u>Victorian Reportable Conduct Scheme</u>) is a ready required after the first five years of operation)

The Victorian Government accepts in princip e the key recommendation that aws concerning mandatory reporting to chi d protection authorities shou d be expanded, inc uding to peop e in re igious ministries

The Victorian Government wi give further consideration to the key recommendation that mandatory reporting aws should not exempt people in religious ministry from being required to report information disclosed in a religious confession

#### Recordkeeping and information sharing

<u>Vo ume 8</u> contains 23 recommendations regarding recordkeeping and information sharing between institutions in order to improve the identification, prevention and response to incidents and risks of child sexual abuse

The Victorian Government accepts three recommendations in Vo ume 8, and accepts in princip e 20 recommendations

The Victorian Government has introduced a <u>Chi d nformation Sharing Scheme</u> which wi begin on 3 September 2018 for the first phase of organisations t is designed to he p authorised professiona s working with chi dren and fami ies across key services share information to promote the we being and safety of chi dren, consistent with recommendations made by the Roya Commission

The Victorian Government accepts the fo owing key recommendations

- that pub ic records authorities should ensure that records relating to child sexual abuse that has occurred or is a leged to have occurred are retained for at least 45 years
- that pub ic records authorities should provide guidance to government and non-government
  institutions on identifying records which may reasonably become relevant to an actual or
  a leged incident of child sexual abuse, and on the retention and disposal of such records

The Victorian Government accepts in principe the following key recommendations, which require collaboration with other jurisdictions

- that governments should enable national sharing of information in relation to teachers and students
- that government should introduce nationally consistent egislation to a low for the sharing of information related to the safety and we being of children

#### Advocacy, support and therapeutic treatment services

<u>Vo ume 9</u> makes nine recommendations for improved advocacy, support and therapeutic services for victims and survivors

The Victorian Government accepts in princip e seven recommendations in Vo ume 9 and notes two recommendations that are matters for the Austra ian Government

The Victorian Government accepts in principe the following key recommendations

- that governments should fund special ist support services, including services for Aboriginal and Torres Strait is ander people, and people with disability
- that governments should establish and fund a national centre to raise awareness, support and guide therapeutic treatments for survivors of child sexual abuse

#### Children with harmful sexual behaviours

<u>Vo ume 10</u> makes seven recommendations about improving prevention and increasing the range of interventions avai ab e for chi dren with harmfu sexua behaviours

The Victorian Government accepts two recommendations in Vo ume 10 and accepts in princip e five recommendations

The Victorian Government has <u>introduced reforms to intervene ear y with chi dren and young peop e who disp ay prob em sexua behaviours</u> as part of the government's response to the recommendations of the <u>Roya Commission into Fami y Vio ence</u> This inc uded investment in the Sexua y Abusive Behaviour Treatment Service

The Victorian Government accepts the fo owing key recommendations that a ready exist in Victoria

- that there should be a ear referral pathways for children with harmful sexual behaviours to access expert assessment and therapeutic intervention
- that therapeutic intervention for chi dren with harmfu sexua behaviours shou d be based on princip es recommended by the Roya Commission

The Victorian Government accepts in principe the recommendation that harmfu sexua behaviours by chi dren should be addressed through primary prevention strategies to educate families, community members, carers and professionals (including mandatory reporters) about preventing harmful sexual behaviours

#### Historical residential institutions

<u>Vo ume 11</u> discusses the Roya Commission's examination of institutional responses to child sexual abuse in residential institutions such as children's homes, missions, reformatories and hospitals between the Second World War and 1990. Volume 11 contains no recommendations

#### Contemporary out-of-home care

<u>Vo ume 12</u> makes 22 recommendations to prevent chi d sexua abuse from occurring in outof-home care and, where it does occur, to he p ensure effective responses

The Victorian Government accepts six recommendations in Vo ume 12, accepts in princip e 15 recommendations, and wi give further consideration to recommendation 12 6, which, a though partial y implemented in Victoria, requires further review

The Victorian Government accepts the fo owing key recommendations, which are a ready fu y or partia y imp emented in Victoria

- that an improved mode of assessment appropriate y tai ored for kinship/re ative care should be adopted
- that resources shou d be deve oped to assist service providers to provide additiona support for chi dren, carers and caseworkers, a ong with regu ar consu tation with chi dren in out-of-home care
- that training for foster and re ative/kinship carers, residentia care staff and chi d protection workers shou d inc ude an understanding of trauma and abuse

The Victorian Government has imp emented significant reform to the chi dren, youth and family services system via imp ementation of the Roadmap for Reform Strong Families, Safe Chi dren aunched in April 2016, the Roadmap for Reform Strong Families, Safe Chi dren sets out the Victorian Government's commitment to build a better future for children, young people and families and details the Victorian Government's strategy to deliver a system focused on

- · strengthening communities to better prevent neg ect and abuse
- de ivering ear y support to chi dren and fami ies at risk
- keeping more fami ies together through crisis
- securing a better future for chi dren who cannot ive at home

#### Schools

<u>Vo ume 13</u> makes eight recommendations to prevent chi d sexua abuse from occurring in schoo s and, where it does occur, to he p ensure effective responses

The Victorian Government accepts in princip e seven recommendations in Vo ume 13 and notes one recommendation that is a matter for the Austra ian Government

To support schoo s to imp ement the Victorian Chi d Safe Standards the Department of Education and Training provides detailed guidance, too s and resources on <a href="the PROTECT">the PROTECT</a> This guidance has been developed in consultation with the government and nongovernment school sectors and the Victorian Registration and Qualifications Authority

The Victorian Government accepts in princip e the fo owing key recommendations, which require further review of Victoria's existing approaches in ight of the Roya Commission's recommendations

 that comp aint hand ing po icies shou d inc ude effective procedures for managing comp aints about chi dren with harmfu sexua behaviours

- that nationally consistent and easily accessible guidance to teachers and principals should be provided on preventing and responding to child sexual abuse in a government and non-government schools
- that teacher registration requirements should be strengthened to better protectichi dren from sexual abuse in schools

Victoria wi work with the Austra ian Government and state and territory governments regarding recommendations reating to nationa consistency

#### Sport, recreation, arts, culture, community and hobby groups

<u>Vo ume 14</u> makes four recommendations to prevent chi d sexua abuse from occurring in sport and recreation and, where it does occur, to he p ensure effective responses

The Victorian Government accepts one recommendation in Volume 14, accepts in principle one recommendation, and notes two recommendations that are matters for the Australian Government

The Victorian Government accepts the recommendation that the oversight body that imp ements the Chi d Safe Standards should establish a free email subscription function for the sport and recreation sector so that a providers of these services to children can subscribe to receive relevant child safe information and links to resources. The Victorian Commissioner for Children and Young People a ready performs this function

The Victorian Government accepts in princip e the recommendation that a sport and recreation institutions, inc uding arts, cu ture, community and hobby groups, shou d imp ement the ten Chi d Safe Standards recommended by the Roya Commission n Victoria, since January 2017, sport and recreation institutions have been required to comp y with the <u>Victorian Chi d Safe Standards</u> A review of the <u>Victorian Chi d Safe Standards</u> wi be undertaken in 2018–19 and wi consider adjustments to better a ign with the Roya Commission's recommendations during that review

#### Contemporary detention environments

<u>Vo ume 15</u> makes 15 recommendations to prevent chi d sexua abuse from occurring in detention environments and, where it does occur, to he p ensure effective responses

The Victorian Government accepts five recommendations in Vo ume 15, accepts in princip e five recommendations, and notes five recommendations that are matters for the Austra ian Government

The Victorian Government accepts the fo owing key recommendations

- that interna and externa compaint handing systems concerning youth detention shoud be reviewed to ensure they are capabe of effective y dealing with compaints of child sexual abuse
- that building and design features of youth detention should be reviewed to identify and address elements that may place children at risk
- that a staff in youth detention should be provided with training and ongoing professional
  development in trauma-informed care to assist them to meet the needs of children in
  youth detention, including children at risk of sexual abuse and children with harmful
  sexual behaviours

#### **Religious institutions**

<u>Vo ume 16</u> makes 58 recommendations directed at a re igious institutions in Austra ia t a so makes recommendations directed at specific re igious institutions

The Victorian Government notes a recommendations in Volume 16, which are matters for religious institutions

#### Beyond the Royal Commission

<u>Vo ume 17</u> makes six recommendations regarding monitoring and reporting on the imp ementation of recommendations

The Victorian Government accepts two recommendations in Volume 17, and notes four recommendations that are matters for the Austra ian Government or institutions

The Victorian Government accepts the key recommendations that governments should

- issue a forma response to the Fina Report within six months
- report on imp ementation annual y for five years

#### Working with Children Checks Report (2015)

n its <u>Working with Children Checks Report</u>, the Roya Commission recommended the Austra ian Government faci itate and manage a 'nationa mode' for Working With Chi dren Checks (WWCC), and that jurisdictions amend their WWCC aws to implement common minimum standards. The WWCC Report contains 36 recommendations

The Victorian Government accepts 14 recommendations, which Victoria has a ready imp emented, inc uding the fo owing key recommendations

- that WWCC aws shou d be amended to provide that work must invo ve contact between an adu t and one or more chi dren to qua ify as 'chi d-re ated work'
- that egis ation should be introduced to specify that it is irrelevant whether direct contact with children is supervised or unsupervised for the purposes of requiring a WWCC
- that WWCC aws should be amended to incorporate a consistent and simplified list of offences

The other recommendations in the <u>Working with Children Checks Report</u> require coordinated nationa action Victoria is working with the Austra ian Government and state and territory governments to progress these recommendations. The Victorian Government accepts in principe 16 of those recommendations, and will give further consideration to five of those recommendations.

As recommendation 2 is directed so e y at South Austra ia, the Victorian Government notes this recommendation

#### Redress and Civil Litigation Report (2015)

Fifteen recommendations in the <u>Redress and Civil Litigation Report</u> re ate to reforms to civil itigation. The Victorian Government has implemented a of these recommendations. Many of these reforms were introduced in response to <u>Betrayal of Trust</u>. The Victorian Government accepts the recommendations, which are a ready implemented in Victoria, including

- the introduction of egis ation to remove of the imitation period in chi d abuse cases
- the <u>introduction of egis ation to impose a non-de egab e duty on certain institutions</u> for institutiona chi d sexua abuse
- the <u>introduction of egis ation to assist a chi d abuse p aintiff to identify a proper</u> defendant
- the adoption of guide ines for responding to c aims for compensation concerning a egations of child sexual abuse

The <u>Redress and Civil Litigation Report</u> contains a further 84 recommendations re ated to redress

The Victorian Government accepts 42 of the recommendations re ated to redress and accepts in princip e 41 recommendations

On 9 March 2018, Victoria was one of the first states in the country to sign up to the <u>Nationa</u> <u>Redress Scheme</u> On 7 June 2018, the Victorian Government passed egis ation to refer powers to the Commonwea th Par iament to a ow Victorian institutions to participate in the Scheme This wirespond to key recommendations of <u>Betrayal of Trust</u> and the Roya Commission

The Victorian Government wi give further consideration to recommendation 48, which recommends that the Nationa Redress Scheme have no fixed c osing date This question wibe further considered and agreed by participating institutions when the Nationa Redress Scheme is reviewed

#### **Criminal Justice Report (2017)**

The <u>Criminal Justice Report</u> makes 85 recommendations that address a broad range of issues, inc uding the reporting, investigation and prosecution of chi d sexua abuse offences, and crimina and evidence aw

The recommendations made by the Roya Commission wi be instrumenta as the Victorian Government continues to reform the crimina justice system to support victims of crime and strengthen aws to better protect chi dren from abuse

The Victorian Government accepts 30 recommendations in the <u>Criminal Justice</u>
<u>Report</u>, accepts in princip e 29 recommendations, wi give further consideration to 16 recommendations and notes 10 recommendations that are directed at states other than Victoria, institutions or survivor advocacy groups, or are otherwise not re evant to Victoria

The Victorian Government accepts the fo owing key recommendations which are a ready implemented in Victoria, including

- the introduction of a broad grooming offence which captures any communication or conduct with a chi d with the intent of committing chi d sexua abuse
- the introduction of position of authority offences
- the repea of imitation periods for the prosecution of sexua offences

- the introduction of ground ru es hearings
- the introduction of reforms to judicia directions, expert evidence, reducing de ay, evidence of good character, and sentencing standards
- the adoption of guiding princip es for prosecution responses to chi d sexua abuse
- the introduction of a ternative arrangements for giving evidence for witnesses in sexua offence or family violence cases

The Victorian Government accepts in princip e 29 recommendations that are a ready partia y imp emented in Victoria, but where the recommendation varies s ight y from the existing Victorian mode or changes to practice are required

The Victorian Government wi give further consideration to 16 recommendations where the recommendation raises comp ex ega and po icy issues that require further examination, including

- that re igious confessions should not be excepted from the offence for failure to report child sexual abuse. The current Victorian 'failure to disclose' offence does contain such an exception, consistent with the recommendations of Betrayal of Trust.
- recommendations re ating to tendency and coincidence evidence, which are current y under consideration by a working group of the Counci of Attorneys Genera
